Triple annual revenues for homeless transitional housing agency, managing +\$8 million in government contracts, almost \$2 million in donations, \$1.5 million in foundation grants and relations with a six-figure private donor. Lead successful advocacy campaign for conversion of 5-acre military base site into Serna Village, creating an 84-unit residential complex as Sacramento County’s first & largest homeless family reunification program. Launch research study that documents cost avoidance/savings reinvestment strategy that identifies financing source for future programming ([Supportive Housing for Homeless Families: Foster Care Outcomes & Best Practices](#)).
